MARSP ambassadors meet with legislators to promote retiree issues

A small but vocal army of MARSP members converged on the State Capitol May 13 and bent the ears of Michigan senators and representatives on the importance of defined-benefit pensions for Michigan public school employees during Legislative Outreach Day.

The 29 volunteers met with 22 members of the House and 16 members of the Senate and urged them to let the pension reforms of recent years have a chance to work. Legislators too often hear from others that "closing" the MPSERS Defined Benefit Plan and moving to 401(k)-type Defined Contribution Plans would save the state money. The Michigan Legislature enacted significant reforms to MPSERS in 2007, 2010 and 2012 that have strengthened the financial health of the system by paying down existing debt and reducing future obligations.


"Because MARSP's Outreach Days are conducted regularly – and with MARSP members participating – we demonstrate commitment and resolve," explains Mark Guastella, MARSP executive director. "Protecting retired school employees' pensions and benefits is a marathon, not a sprint. That is underscored by great attendance for our Outreach Days."

MARSP members had key talking points in their meetings with lawmakers on Senate Bill 102, to close out the Defined Benefit System, and House Bill 4059, a bill to address the shortage of substitute teachers:

Closing a pension system requires accelerated funding to both cover cash flow and ensure full funding of retiree pensions. Closing MPSERS would cost the state budget more than \$2 billion over the next four years, and \$679 million in the first year alone.

- Closing MPSERS to new hires is unnecessary. The current Hybrid Plan, into which new hires are placed, is more than 100 percent funded.
- The latest data from the Michigan Department of Treasury indicates that the MPSERS' funded ratio is continuing to improve after enactment of the 2012 reforms, with an estimated market value funded ratio of 73.5 percent as of December 31, 2014.
- The additional, normal cost associated with closing the Hybrid Plan in favor of a Defined Contribution-only Plan, modeled after the current state employee plan, is \$13.6 billion over 30 years. That does not include the need for accelerated funding from closing MPSERS.
- While MARSP did not agree with every aspect of the recent reforms, we believe the reforms are working in a positive fashion to improve the fiscal health of the system and protect retiree benefits. We encourage legislators to let the reforms continue to work going forward.

Legislation would lessen teacher shortages

Under current law, teachers who retired after July 1, 2010, are prohibited from serving as substitute teachers in districts that contract for subs without agreeing to suspend their pension and retiree healthcare benefits. The prohibition also limits the ability of schools to fill critical shortage vacancies in subject areas – such as math or science – with qualified retirees. The situation was created as an unintended consequence of legislation enacted in 2010, and is having a detrimental effect on the ability of school districts to ensure quality instruction.

- The penalties in state law needlessly limit the pool of knowledgeable, experienced retirees available to school districts to fill short-term needs.
- The problem will only get worse going forward as the pool of available teachers with recent classroom experience and subject matter expertise continues to shrink.
- House Bill 4059, sponsored by Rep. Holly Hughes (R-Montague), passed the House 108-2 and provides a balanced solution to the problem. It gets retirees back in the classroom to provide quality instruction, while ensuring stability and paying down MPSERS liabilities. MARSP supports HB 4059, which is currently awaiting action in the Senate Education Committee.

"The MARSP Legislative Ambassadors performed admirably on your behalf," says

President Bob Wiles. "We are fortunate to have such dedicated, well-spoken representatives communicating our positions face-to-face with members of the Michigan Legislature."


There is more to MARSP than the work we do as your advocates. It is something that is hard to identify or describe in words.

ORS Update

Pension investments gather steam

The state's pension fund investments are much better off today compared with seven years ago, says the executive director of the Michigan Office of Retirement Services (ORS), who spoke to MARSP board members recently.

Phil Stoddard recalled the state's dismal investment picture in 2008 as he was taking the reins of the state agency. The stock market was just

beginning to tank, he told the group, and then came what is now referred to as the Great Recession. Fast-forward seven years and net assets for the pension fund stand at a healthy \$12 billion (as of December 2014). From 2013 to 2014 alone, total net assets increased \$1.4 billion.

Stoddard, who has been with ORS since 1988, stresses that investment returns today are strong and have restored some of the losses from the Great Recession, which puts Michigan on a path for future growth.

The ORS leader also pointed out that:

- Nearly 70 percent of the system's funding comes from investment earnings.
- Retirees' spending injects more than \$4.6 billion into local Michigan economies.
- About 88 percent of ORS retirees stay in Michigan.
- MPSERS membership includes 200,000 retirees and beneficiaries, and 210,000 current employees.

In terms of health care funding and assets, Stoddard noted that specialty drug costs are rapidly becoming the No. 1 cost driver for health care. ORS routinely rebids contracts for health care and pharmaceutical benefits, ensuring strong service for its members and great value for the future stability of the ORS plan.

Failing to plan for retirement is not an option, he told the group of board members, quoting Benjamin Franklin, who once advised that failing to plan is essentially planning to fail.

Legislative Committee Report





Legislature under pressure to fill road funding gap

During the past few months, we explained our reasoning behind our support for Proposal 1. While we knew it had an extremely large mountain to climb, we believed it held the best chance for a road repair and replacement strategy, while also enacting policies that would have improved school funding and protected K-12 funding from outside interests in the current legislative environment.

With Proposal 1 defeated, we must look for a solution to the road problems and hope that politics will not drag school funding and/or retirement benefits into the fray.

School funding and retirement benefits play no part in the road funding issue. However, our concern is the risk of some

ideological opponents of our retirement benefits pairing support for a roads deal against funding of any school-related projects.

For example, higher education funding, which has traditionally been a General Fund (GF) appropriation, could be funded through the School Aid Fund (SAF) in order to free up GF dollars for road repairs. Such a simple act could reduce per-pupil funding at every district and additionally add pressure to reduce the funding for our retirement benefits. Such "horse trading" is bad public policy, but in today's environment it would not be surprising.

Because state revenues are not growing at the accelerated pace expected when the 2010 tax reforms were enacted, the

Legislature is under enormous pressure to find creative methods to fund traditional appropriations. It's very possible our programs could be at risk.

It is exceptionally rare that legislation is developed to address a specific need. All legislators have a favorite project and if they can find a method to get it accomplished by attaching it to another piece of legislation, they will do just that. Don't become complacent because you believe the failure of Proposal 1 should make the Legislature accomplish road funding as a stand-alone matter. Stay aware of the proposals being made and make clear to your legislators that any action to reduce our benefits or school funding is unacceptable.
