Executive Director's Message

Carpe Diem - Seize The Day

Once upon a time, I spent a portion of my life coaching high school athletics. I had the opportunity to coach Track and Field as well as Cross Country. I really enjoyed it. I was very fortunate to have a great group of student-athletes, assistant coaches, and supportive parents. Of course, it also came with plenty of challenges (as you can probably imagine).

I can look back now and see that we came a long way in a relatively short period of time. We started off as a small group that wasn't all that successful and we turned into a consistent title-winning force. Of course, when an athletic program makes such a positive shift, the questions start pouring in about how we were able to make such a change in our outcomes.

While it was honestly a combination of factors, I do believe that there was one core change we made that helped us in our transformation journey. Instead of thinking of workouts as something we 'had to do', we started thinking about them as something we 'get to do'. I know...it seems like a small change to a vocabulary that wouldn't really make a difference, but it did.



For example, in the early days of the cross country program, I wouldn't allow the athletes to run more than a mile. It made for relatively short practices but it left them wanting to do more. The way the workouts were structured had each individual running certain distances in a certain amount of time (each distance and time tailored to the current skill and capacity of the individual). If they were not able to do it, they would stay at that step in the program until they were 'ready for the opportunity to do more'.

From there, the vocabulary change started. Student-athletes would seize the opportunity to achieve more. They were excited as they left practice that they 'get to' run further and faster the next day. Of course, when they shared this excitement with their friends in other sports, they looked at them with disbelief at

the excitement of 'getting to' run more...

I encourage you to consider what you 'get to' do that is ultimately best for you. It may include some goals you have for your health. It may include everyday chores or errands. It may be something big or small, but consider changing your mindset about 'having to do it' to 'getting to do it'.

While we are on the topic, I would encourage you to consider our Early Renewal Program. You would 'get to' ensure your membership is renewed and not have something come up later in the year that causes you to forget or delay renewing. Those who renew early are also entered in a drawing for a \$100 dollar gift card! Renewing early also helps our organization by reducing the number of memberships that need processing all at once. 



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What to Know About Signing Petitions

Petitions can be used for positive or negative outcomes. But how do you know if the petition you are signing is positive or negative? With several petition drives being active right now, we wanted to underscore some points to consider when you are approached by a petitioner.

1) Find out WHO initiated the petition

If it's not an individual or group you already know and trust, you should try to look it up online or check with trusted sources and do some independent vetting on your own. Try doing an online search for the petitioner's name in quotation marks (i.e., "Jane Doe") with something that might help narrow down the search, such as the name of their organization or their hometown.

2) Be mindful of how it is PRESENTED

Don't take any facts and figures cited at their word, especially if they feel like exaggerations or falsifications that you can easily check online. Use reliable news sources that can be factual, non-partisan sources to help you research anything that sounds confusing (or suspicious).

3) Read the FINE print

Reading the fine print is particularly important to do when you're signing your name to a petition. You need to have a clear understanding of the petition's specific ask and nothing should be confusing or unclear. If you don't read everything, you could be signing a petition that does not represent your actual viewpoint on the issue. Usually, the petition will have a summary paragraph on it at the top, but keep in mind that there can also be supplemental pages with the full text explaining what you are signing.

4) Every petition will have a POSITIVE spin. That doesn't make it positive.

Consider that a petition is not likely to be successful if it sounds negative. So EVERY petition is going to present the information in a positive way, even if you don't actually agree with the outcomes. The creators of the petition will likely even use words that you care about. For example, you may value and support education. A petitioner can make it sound like what you are signing is good for education, but once you learn more about it, you may actually disagree with their actions.

5) Keep in mind, petitioners CAN lie.

The person asking you to sign the petition doesn't necessarily have to be telling the truth. They can bend, distort, or withhold the truth about the outcomes of the petition. Their goal is to gain signatures. In some cases, they are compensated based on the number of signatures they collect.

6) You CAN say NO.

When approached by a petitioner, especially in person, you can feel pressured to sign. They are probably saying positive things about a topic you care about. You CAN say no. At least until you learn more about the petition you are signing. If they don't respect that you want to learn more about it before signing, that's probably a red flag that they don't want you to do independent research. If you find out later that you are actually in support of the initiative, you can always reach back out to them later to sign.

7) What does your GUT say?

The last check you should do is of critical importance: Pay attention to your instincts. If something feels off, it's probably off — don't sign it.



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Legislative Committee Report

Legislative Update

The Legislative Committee is Co-Chaired by Chuck Abshagen and Georgia Sharp

We are happy to report the Governor publicly announced her support for repealing the pension tax in the State of the State Address in January.

While the State of the State Address gives us a preview of the Governor's priorities for the year, the key details will become more clear once her actual budget proposal is shared in February. From there, the legislature will take the next few months to evaluate and consider the Governor's budget while also proposing their own.

We are seeing some legislative leaders expressing interest publicly in reducing taxation, but the details are where there will likely be challenges. The specifics of how the key stakeholders see this happening will be made more clear in the coming weeks and months.

MARSP continues to be an active part of advancing this legislative priority for our members. To stay informed, be on the lookout for future updates as this process unfolds and we ask members to take specific actions at certain times to amplify our effectiveness

in advocacy. MARSP will stay connected with the Governor's office and key legislators to monitor and take action as appropriate.
