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From Supporting Role to Lead: Sue Jakubiak, MARSP's New President

"What are you going to do next?"

This was the number one question asked of Sue Jakubiak, MARSP's new president, as she circulated her St. Clair County Community College retirement party in 2011. While talking to one of the college's board members, she confessed that she had no idea what she was going to do next. She had not even officially left yet!

The board member offered comfort: Don't worry – with your skill set, you don't have to look for something to do. It will find you.

"MARSP found me not long after," Sue recalled. After her second husband passed away in 2016, college friend and MARSP member, Cindy Rourke, convinced Sue to attend a Blue Water Chapter meeting. Sue had been thinking about finding somewhere to volunteer, and MARSP's mission caught her attention.

"As a single person, I needed the focus. And what better way to spend your free time than by protecting your livelihood and health care?"

Growing up, public school service was a family affair. With her dad a head custodian and her

mom a bus driver, Sue respected and understood the importance of school support staff for daily operations. By her sophomore year, Sue was an office co-op student at Richmond High School. After graduating, she continued working at Richmond Community Schools as a K-12 secretary, board office payroll clerk, accounts payable, and general ledger accountant. Half her career later, she began working as a community college president's administrative assistant, event planner, and member of the president's executive leadership team.

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Sue knew how to bring people together, and as a new MARSP member, she was eager to apply her skills and experience. Over the next eight years, she would serve as a Pension Seminar presenter for MARSP Retirement Planning Services, Membership chair of her local Blue Water Chapter, a State Membership and Legislative Committees member, and a Legislative Ambassador.

Though she'd spent her career assisting leaders, Sue didn't quite consider herself a leader. So, it was quite a surprise when former MARSP president Bob Kucera called her in 2019 and offered her the position of MARSP Vice President. Not only Vice President but future President following the end of Steve Gordon's term in 2023.

"I was stunned. I said, 'Bob, I am flattered, but I can't believe you're asking me. MARSP presidents are retired administrators with several degrees after their name."

Sue couldn't relate to that version of leader. After graduating as her high school class valedictorian, she'd attended business classes at Macomb County Community College, followed by a full-time job, marriage, and children. In 1987 at age 36, Sue unexpectedly became a widow with an 8, 9, and 11-year-old to support on a clerical salary.

"After raising three children by myself for 10 years, I guess you could say I had the education of hard knocks," said Sue.

Bob, the head of MARSP's nominating committee, told her that the decision was unanimous. She was the "perfect person for the job."

"Bob nudged me out of my comfort zone, and I have no regrets," Sue reflected.

Sue's focus as MARSP President

On July 1, 2023, Sue assumed her role as MARSP President after serving as Vice President and President-elect. Six months in and she's still shocked by the turn of events.

"As a former support staff person, I never dreamed I would be named president of such an important organization," she said. "I'm honored that my skills and personality are such that I was considered for the role."

As president, she is focused on bringing the MARSP community back together post-pandemic and on reaching out to potential members. She is particularly interested in building awareness among retired support staff like her.

A return on investment

Suffice it to say, Sue no longer wonders what she'll do next. She's found camaraderie at MARSP, and countless opportunities to apply her skills and foster growth. The once rigid line that existed between "support" and "lead" has faded, just as it has for so many in the public school arena, and she now sees the qualities of a leader woven into her history. Today, those qualities guide her actions as MARSP President and shape her message to current and future retirees:

"I would encourage everyone to consider a MARSP membership. Consider what we offer in terms of socialization, advocacy, travel, and insurance. MARSP helps protect your livelihood today and in the future. Not just yours, but the active people still working the daily grind. What we lobby for today affects these future retirees. The simple act of paying your dues goes a long way in this effort, but volunteer opportunities are there, too, if you want them. If you get involved, you will get a return on every second you invest."

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No Place for Complacency



<u>The Bottom Line</u>

You may have noticed this; when things are calm, people tend to slide into a state of smug inactivity. The weather is nice, the lawn is mowed, the car is washed. The bills have been paid and all is well with the world. What a great time to grab a beer and a bag of chips, watch a little football and enjoy some self-congratulatory revelry. Maybe this is just a natural component of human behavior, normal after mountains have been climbed, deserts crossed and bridges built. Complacency then, is perhaps just the reward that we give ourselves for jobs well done. But the connotation associated with this thinking is generally bad; is it possible that complacency has just gotten a bad rap?

Complacency: "A feeling of calm satisfaction with one's abilities or situation that prevents trying harder or condones the status quo."

Well, that doesn't sound too bad...and besides, what harm has a little complacency ever done? Let's see what we can learn from the long history of bad news:

In April of 1912, complacent thinking among designers, engineers and the ship's owners encouraged Titanic's captain to steam at full speed through the dark, iceberg-infested waters of the North Atlantic in pursuit of a record-setting maiden voyage. Titanic and her sister ships were considered the safest in the world because the ships' design featured water-tight spaces intended to prevent flooding in the event of damage to the hull. In reality, the ships were just huge ice cube trays because the compartment walls did not reach to their ceilings. As the ship

began to settle following the collision, water poured over the tops of the walls from one compartment into the next and the ship sank in about three hours. Other poor decisions included the failure to schedule evacuation drills for the ship's 2,200 passengers and crew. More than 1,500 people died in the frigid water that night.

Countless other examples exist: Hitler's rise to power during the 1930s, the successful attack by the Japanese at Pearl Harbor in 1941, the current climate crisis. In nearly all untoward events there are elements of complacency (in cahoots with inattention, mindless ignorance, denial and wishful thinking) playing significant roles. Complacency has compiled a terrible track record. This kind of thinking also has serious repercussions for MPSERS retirees because complacency has crept into the mindsets of Michigan's public school employees.

With the Governor and Legislature busy with other issues, MPSERS folks may be tempted to think that no one is staring with hungry eyes at the financial resources (roughly \$70 billion at the close of FY 2022) invested and utilized by the retirement system. But history clearly teaches that the winds of political thought and motivation constantly change. Today's solid foundation for retiree benefits might easily become tomorrow's quicksand. Michigan is now home to over 200 thousand MPSERS retirees and nearly as many active employees. How many of these folks are members of MARSP, actively involved in the defense of their retirement system? Not 400 thousand, that's certain...and those people (and their beneficiaries) should all be members, if for no other reason than to protect their own interests. Still, they sit on the sidelines.

One of the largest legislative attacks made on the Michigan Public School Employees' Retirement System took place in the summer of 2017 when the defined-benefit pension program narrowly avoided closure.* MARSP stepped in and showed decision-makers the pitfalls and costs of such a radical change. The Legislature listened, and the program was preserved. Since then, many MPSERS folks—both active and retired—have come to feel that a sudden attack like the one in 2017 is impossible. Those who think this way are as wrong as those who failed to schedule lifeboat

drills on the Titanic and those at Pearl Harbor who failed to demand sufficient vigilance leading up to that infamous Sunday morning.

While the future may be a mystery, the pendelum of history compels us to stress the importance of joining MARSP to both retired and active public school employees. Throughout MARSP's 70+ years, it has been the strong voice needed to defend our pensions and health care when the pendelum swings against us. The Bottom Line here is stark; if we public school employees and retirees choose to sit on our hands now, we guarantee a weaker MARSP when future threats emerge. And then, the strong voice needed to defend MPSERS will be but a whisper in the wind.

MARSP has been at it since 1951. Each member since our establishment has played a part in making us the respected voice in Lansing that it we are today. Here are some of our latest, most notable accomplishments:

2023

After a 12-year push, we celebrated the passing of Public Act 4, which phases out the 2011 tax on public school pensions. If you were born after 1945, this victory boosts your retirement income.

We assessed member satisfaction with MPSERS dental, vision, and hearing coverage. We sent the findings to ORS, who used our recommendations to improve your health plan.

2022

MARSP members and supporters flooded legislators inboxes with calls to repeal the tax on public school pensions using our new advocacy software.

2020-2021

We earned significant victories when the Legislature passed critical shortage bills to simplify the process and eliminate penalties for retirees returning to work in their district.

2018-2019

We counteracted a risky proposal to use funds from the retirement system for state projects.

2017

Influential forces in the Legislature were poised to close MPSERS defined benefit pension program. MARSP was the only retiree association invited to provide input. We showed decision-makers the costs and pitfalls of such a radical change, and the program was preserved.

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Updates to MPSERS Health Plan Coverage for 2024

All changes are effective on January 1, 2024.



Blue Cross Blue Shield PPO & Optum Rx

Non-Medicare

- ER copay increases to \$135 and is waived on admittance within 72 hours.
- The plan-approved virtual care vendor changed to Teledoc Health.
- The following preventive screening will be covered in full in-network:
 - Breast cancer screening (mammogram)
 - Pap test and pelvic exam
 - Prostate cancer screening
 - Colonoscopy screening
- Retail health clinics will be covered places of service.
- 10% penalty for 30-day maintenance drugs is removed.
- 90-day supplies of medication will be covered at a retail phamacies.
- Specialty medication coverage will no longer be exclusive to Optum Specialty. 40% coinsurance with a \$50 minimum/no maximum will apply to specialty medications purchased at a non-preferred pharmacy
- A specialty copay card solution will be implemented for coupon cards used for specialty medications. To reflect true out-of-pocket costs more accurately, members receive credit towards their out-of-pocket maximum for a drug cost they pay out-of-pocket.
- Members will have an opportunity to utilize divvyDOSE pharmacy. divvyDOSE is a full-service pharmacy that pre-sorts your prescription medications, vitamins and/or supplements by day, date, and time.

Medicare

- Emergency room copay will be increased to \$135 per visit. Copay will continue to be waived if admitted to the hospital within 72 hours.
- Blue Cross will be changing their plan-approved vendor for virtual care to Teledoc Health. Coverage and out-of-pocket costs will remain the same.
- The 10% additional coinsurance will no longer apply when purchasing a 30-day supply of maintenance medication at a retail pharmacy.
- Members will have an opportunity to utilize divvyDOSE pharmacy. divvyDOSE is a full-service pharmacy that pre-sorts your prescription medications, vitamins and/or supplements by day, date, and time.

Blue Care Network HMO

Non-Medicare

Mobile mental health benefits will be added in select counties. Services will be covered in full.

Non-Medicare

- The deductible will be increased to \$500 per person and \$1000 per family
- The medical annual coinsurance maximum will be increased to \$1000 per person and \$2,000 per family

Priority Health HMO

Non-Medicare

• The non-Medicare benefits are not changing at all for 2024.

Medicare

- In Network
 - Deductible: \$550 (was \$525)
 - Out of Pocket Max: \$2,500 (was \$2,300)
 - There will no longer be a copay applied to primary care provider visits.

TruHearing

No changes to member cost share or hearing aid coverage.

Dental

- Occlusal guards will be covered once every five years.
- Posterior composite fillings (white fillings on the back teeth) will be covered as a standard benefit.

Vision

• Eye Exams, new lenses (or Contact lenses) and frames will be covered every 12 months.



IMPORTANT ANNOUCEMENT FROM THE OFFICE OF RETIREMENT SERVICES

The Michigan Office of Retirement Services (ORS) has continued the suspension of the annual Verification of Coverage (VOC) survey for 2024. This means you DO NOT have to submit a VOC survey in 2024. 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

HB 5021: Making Pension Plus 2 the **Default Retirement Plan for New Employees**

In September, House Education Chair Matt Koleszar (D-Plymouth) introduced House Bill 5021, which would make the Pension Plus 2 Hybrid Plan the new auto-enrollment retirement option for new school employees. This plan offers both Defined Contribution (a 401k, for example) and Defined Benefit (pension) components.

Defined Contribution has been the default plan since 2018. Since then, 58% of employees did not decide on a retirement plan within 75 days of their first paycheck and were automatically enrolled into the default plan. 25% elected Pension Plus 2 and 17% chose Defined Contribution. MARSP supports this bill, which was passed by the House on a party-line vote. Over the last 15 years and throughout multiple

MPSERS reforms, MARSP has consistently argued for preserving strong pension benefits for public school employees. Because HB 5021 gives the Pension Plus 2 system even stronger financial footing, MARSP leadership offered formal support for the bill at the committee hearing on Tuesday, September 26.

The Legislative Committee is hopeful this bill will ensure robust retirement benefits for public school personnel and help attract and retain public school professionals in Michigan. We will continue to monitor the progress of HB 5021 and keep you informed.

To date, the fund has been used to educate legislators regarding defined contribution and graded premium insurance subsidy legislation; to research and investigate defined contribution and other plans in other states; to purchase the software needed to provide an effective grassroots network; to provide written information to legislators; and other activities necessary to the protection of school retiree benefits.

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The Michigan Legislature returned for the fall session in September, but word around Lansing is that they may adjourn for the year in early November. Legislation is therefore moving quickly, and few policy items are of particular interest to MARSP:

Public Act 147 of 2023: Allowing Recent Retirees to Return to Work

Public Act 147, originally House Bill 4752, allows retirees to return to work one month after a bonafide retirement date, but with an earnings limit of \$15,100/per calendar year during the first six months. The earnings limit resets at the end of the year, ideally allowing retirees to work a full school year (fall and spring semesters). The Senate Education Committee added a caveat specifically prohibiting retired superintendents from returning to work as superintendents prior to 6 months after retirement.

MARSP supported this bill, which was signed into law as Public Act 147 of 2023 with immediate effect on October 10, 2023.
